Salutations from the History Section

World War I veterans decided to create a veterans organization that would organize to help other Veterans and their families. In March of 1931, White Cloud founded "Sergeant Bowman Post 2053"". It was located on the corner of Barton and Wilcox Streets, which was formerly a blacksmith shop and a truck assembly plant where the Hendrickson truck was designed and assembled. The truck plant later moved to Chicago.

This building was also used as an auditorium and stage where traveling entertainers and dances put on shows. The dance floor was also used as a roller rink.

When the building was approaching 100 years old in the 1980s. In 1990 it was condemned and burned by the fire department. Many of the members transferred their membership to the Newaygo Post.





The Veterans decided to start a new post in White Cloud, Post # 10770. They met at the fire station on the corner of North and Wilcox. The first commander was Leonard Brown, an ex police officer.

This Post had 25 members. They consolidated with the old Sergeant Bowman Post 2053, and became White Cloud Post 2053.

Commander Brown's poor health caused him to resign. Vice Commander Don Lynnes took over for Leonard Brown. Perry Bird moved up to Vice Commander. In April 1990, George Haines was elected Sr. Vice Commander, Dale Ditlow was elected Jr. Vice Commander and Joseph Kukal was elected as the new Quartermaster.

In 1993 Ray Larson was elected commander. He sold the antique machine guns and 1884 rifles that were stored in the basement of city hall.

Each year two or three older members passed away, and it was very difficult to find replacements. To be eligible for membership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) a person must have served during a time of war and must have served over seas. To belong to the American Legion, a person must have served in any branch of service.

Greetings From The Circulation Desk

As you may have noticed, there are a few new changes to our library services. Lakeland Library Cooperative has initiated an **automatic calling system** that lets patrons know when they have items ready for pick up at the library. This great new feature will give you a call when a book or other items that you ordered have arrived at the library. If you are signed up for email notification you will continue to receive your pick up notices via email and will not receive a phone call. You will then have the usual 7 days to come in and pick up your items. If you prefer not to receive the automatic call, please contact the library. We hope you'll find this new service convenient and time-saving.

Beginning April 1st Lakeland will also be implementing **Auto Renewal**. This means that your checked out items will automatically be renewed for you up to 2 times. Please keep in mind that nonrenewable items such as 1-day DVD rentals or PC games, or items with holds will not be automatically


