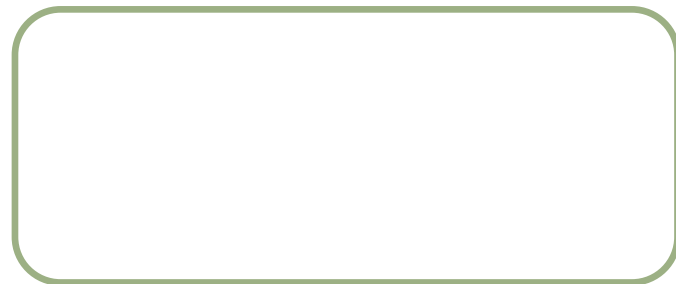

How COVID-19 Has Affected The Library

As you may know, the White Cloud Community Library reopened to the public on July 6th. Since then, we have had to put into place numerous policies, both mandatory and for patron protection. Some of the changes include mandatory face coverings, as mandated by State regulations, an enforced building capacity of 10 patrons, social distancing requirements, reduced seating, enhanced cleaning measures, and a 96-hour quarantine for returned items. Our Exposer, Prevention, Preparedness, and Response Plan is available on our website with much more information on what we are doing to help ensure the safety of our patrons. For the most part these changes have been well received and we would like to thank everyone for their support and understanding. Despite these changes, we wish to continue serving our patrons to the best of our ability!



When we first reopened back in July, we noticed that our door count was understandably low. Since then, we have noticed a slow but steady increase in the number of patrons coming in everyday (although we are still getting calls asking if we have opened up yet!). Even though it may still be a while before things can be considered “back to normal”, we are doing what we can to make sure that we can still provide our usual services to our patrons. Youth events are still being held at Storybook Forest, computers are still usable for a 1-hour sessions, and we are still offering curbside pickups for people not comfortable coming in.



There are also many online resources we can offer to you in your home! Using OverDrive (or Libby on a mobile device), you can “check out” ebooks and audiobooks online for a one week or two week period before they are returned. The Michigan e-Library (MeL) has numerous online resources ranging from academic articles, to vehicle and small engine repair, to children's puzzles! From our website, you can find COVID-19 online resource centers, homework help for kids and teens, senior assistance/care guides, tax information, and much more!

GREETINGS FROM THE CIRCULATION DESK

We hope everyone is doing well as we navigate the “new norm” in our everyday lives. The library has been open to the public since July 6th with the proper CDC guidelines for public safety in place. After a somewhat slow start, our patrons are gradually coming back to the library. As per Lakleland Library Cooperative’s COVID-19 guidelines, all returning items must be quarantined for 96 hours before they can be checked in and returned to the shelf. This means any items you bring back will still show as a checked out item on your card until they have been quarantined and checked in. No fines will be assessed during this



time. We are still offering curbside service to anyone that would prefer not to enter the building. Just give us a call before you arrive or when you’re in the parking lot and we will bring your items out to you.

Many of our patrons are homeschooling their children or doing remote learning during this time. The library is a great source of

materials for reading, science projects, history, math, educational DVDs, whatever your need may be. If we don’t have it in-house, there’s a very good chance we can borrow it for you from another library and have it sent in through interlibrary loan. Also, don’t forget to check out our

statewide resource **mel.org**, Michigan eLibrary. There is a wealth of information available from print books to eBooks to educational resources to Early Learning, Novelist, Explora and so much more. Be sure to check it out!



LIBRARY HAPPENINGS

As you may know, the library had several special programs scheduled for this summer and fall, but unfortunately, because of the COVID-19 situation, things have changed. We had a Backyard Birding program scheduled, as well as a photography program called “Michigan Roadside Reflections”. Both presenters have chosen to do only virtual programs for the remainder of the year. For a portion of Newaygo County, this would be a viable alternative to an in-person presentation, but because so much of our service area is rural, a reliable internet connection is not readily

available to everyone. A virtual program just isn’t a good option for us. On a good note, we do have a returning presenter coming in October to do a program called “**Michigan’s Haunted Lighthouses**”.

Dianna Stampfer was at the library in January and brought us a program called “Made in the Mitten”. She is the President of Promote Michigan, a media outlet that spreads the word about all the wonderful things Michigan has to offer.

Richard A. Crandell

In 1902, Richard A. Crandell (father of Jack) and his wife, Berda May Whitney moved from Portland, Michigan to Fremont to enter into the business with the Scotts. Richard A. Crandell received his license to practice mortuary on December 9, 1915. At this time, a person needed only to pass a written exam and serve a six week apprenticeship. A year after Richard A. Crandell joined the Scotts, Mr. Scott died from complications with Tuberculosis. Richard A. Crandell and the widowed Mrs. Scott continued the business with Mrs. Scott acting as an inactive partner and Richard A. Crandell as an active partner and also manager.

In 1918 Mr. John Ensing became a business partner and the company name changed to Scott, Crandell, & Ensing. Later that year, Mrs. Scott sold her interest in the business to the other partners and the company name was shortened to Crandell & Ensing. *Taken from Crandell's web page.*

Walter Reed To Retire After Many Years in Undertaking Work There

Reed's Funeral Home at White Cloud which has been operated by Walter Reed of that village for many years was purchased by Crandell & Ensing of Fremont last Friday and is now under the operation of the local firm. Jack Crandell of this city will have charge of the establishment.
