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Salutations from the History Section



The White Cloud High School was on the corner of Williams and Newell streets from 1884 until it was demolished in 1960.

The old courthouse was built as the City Hall in 1908. It became the county seat in 1910 and was torn down in 1994.

The White Cloud Depot was where the little league fields are show Billy McGogan and his goat cart.

The wooden railroad trestle, built in 1875, is one of the last still in use today.

The Mill Pond, where many of us learned to swim, displays the life guard stand and the high and low diving boards.

St. Joseph's Catholic Church was built in 1891, and the Seventh Day Baptist Church on the corner of Wilcox and North Streets has been standing there since 1921.

You can still order these historical blocks by contacting Norma Rudert @ 231-689-6703.

The wreath for this years auction featured the wooden windowsill blocks that are hand painted by Susan J. Pouthier and sold by the Seventh Day Baptist Church.

The "Welcome to White Cloud Where The North Begins and Pure Waters Flow" is the original black and white wooden sign that stood from 1936 to 1969.

The "Co-Op" was on Newell Street from 1912 until it was dismantled a few years ago.

Newaygo County Road Commission operated out of their building from 1933 until 1976, and is now the Commission on Aging.
