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DID YOU KNOW ?????

Public Libraries -There are more public libraries than Starbucks in the U.S.—a total of 17,566 including branches. Nearly 100% of public libraries provide Wi-Fi and have no-fee access to computers.

In 2013, there were 1.5 billion in-person visits to public libraries across the U.S., the equivalent of more than 4 million visits each day. That's 2,854 per minute.

Americans check out an average of eight books a

year. They spend \$36.96 a year for the public library – about the average cost of one hardcover book.

There were 96.5 million attendees at public library programs in 2013, more than all Major




Excerpts from "The Ice Wagon's Coming", by Ken Mudget

The following true story is dedicated to my father, Foster Mudget. It's about the old mill pond on the White River at White Cloud in the late 1920's. It's about the ice house.

As I lazily surveyed the mill pond from my vantage point on the wall of the mill race, my eyes and my thoughts centered on the big square old building on the north bank. The old ice house. Now there's something to really dream about.

That big old building looks like it's been there just about forever. That wooden frame work that runs out from the building into the mill pond looks like an old covered bridge. That's what Bill Flaherty calls the conveyor rack. It supports the chain link conveyor that picks up the pieces of ice and carried them way up into the ice house in the winter time.





That old White River sure makes pretty ice in the winter time. It's so clear you can see all the way through it. In the summer time boys would walk up the conveyor, push open the canvas flap and step inside the ice house. The only light inside was seeping in through the cracks and knot-holes of the old pine siding. As their eyes became accustomed to the semi-darkness, everything took on a strange, weird perspective. The large blocks of ice covered with mounds of saw dust,

looked like hills of buried treasure just waiting to be explored and discovered.

Cutting the ice and filling the ice house in early February was always an exciting time. Fresh saw dust was hauled in. The snow was kept shoveled off the ice from the entire area, to be cut for at least two weeks prior to cutting.

The ice cutting machine was an unique piece of equipment. As the vertical cross-cut saw blade operated up and down and cut a slot through the ice the
