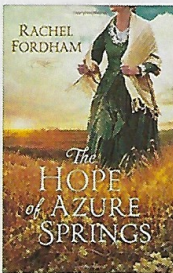

A few library statistics that may be of interest to everyone..In 2017, our library patrons borrowed 667 items through MELCAT (Michigan eLibrary), and we loaned 689 items to other Mel libraries. Our patrons borrowed 1,747 items from other Lakeland Cooperative libraries, and we loaned out 4,918 items. Our patrons also borrowed 2,025 eBooks and audio books through

Overdrive. Those are pretty amazing numbers for our small library! We now have RB Digital, which is also a magazine, eBook and audio book service that our patrons can download to their Kindles, phones and other devices. Ask for information at the circulation desk next time you come in.

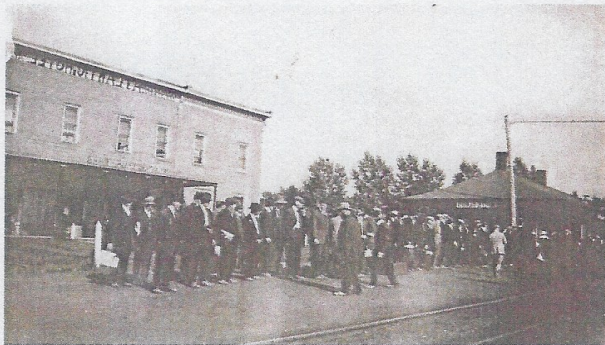
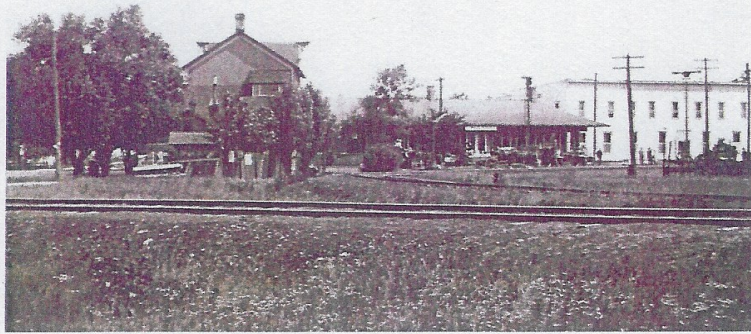

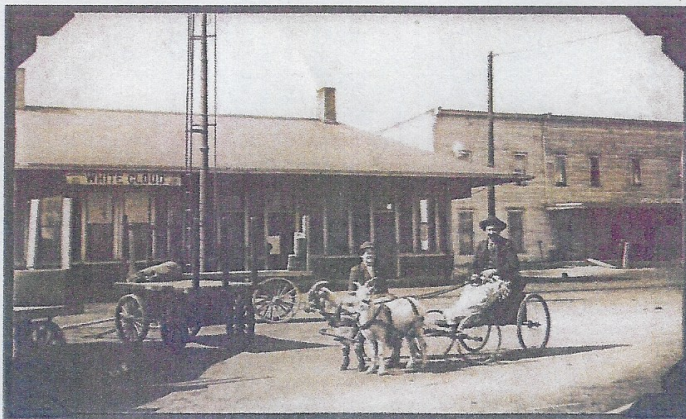

SALUTATIONS FROM THE HISTORY SECTION

There were two hotels at the train station in White Cloud, The Atlantic (on the right hand side) and the Pacific (on the left hand side of the depot). One was for the prominent and dignitaries and the other was for the every day people. Both of the hotels and the train depot are gone now and this land is where our little league kids play ball.



The Atlantic Hotel was where our World War II soldiers waited to board the train for active duty. There were parades and pretty ladies waving flags to send them off.



The Atlantic was centrally and advantageously located directly opposite the P.M. depot. It was strictly first class in all its appointments. The house was run on both European and American plan, with regular meals at proper times, short orders and lunches, numerous delicacies were served in a most palatable manner. It had electric lights, hot air heat, amply provided lavatories on each floor and all the necessary advantages for its guest. *White Cloud Eagle* July 20, 1916.

Bob Auw recalls the old Atlantic Hotel was rented for vaudeville presentations. The hotel was located just to the north of the old White Cloud depot. It was a large two story building with an auditorium and raised stage to the east. Rooms were rented on the second floor.
