
The library is now offering a Military Library Card for all local veter-

White Cloud schools can register for a library card with their student I.D. Restrictions will apply until a parent/guardian signs a registration for full library privileges.








Salutations from the **History Section**



Well, it's finally here. After months and months of researching and writing, and gathering information and proof reading, our second volume of Newaygo County History and Biographies is hot off the press. You can purchase this book for \$25.00 and for an additional \$5.00 have it sent to you. If you missed out of getting volume one, we have eight green hardcovers on sale for the very discounted price of \$35.00, down from the original cost of \$80.00in 2006.

Besides the regular histories from places around the county (Briggs Lumber, the Piggery, White Cloud State Park and Flowing Well for White Cloud) golf courses, newspapers, CCC, women's groups and family photos and stories, this one contains family trees.

The first story in the book is about Fremont's Pearl Button Factory. While researching this, I realized how fresh water mussels found in the local rivers were used to make pearl buttons.

Eighty-five tons of shells were on hand and expected to keep cator reported that all workers the factory running for five months. Women and girls were offered full time employment from 1926 to 1937, when it closed. They were paid an average weekly wage of \$17 to \$19. Husband and wife teams worked at the factory as well as high school teens during the summer.

Button cutting was dangerous

work. The shells could be sharp and spin out of control. The workers wore gloves to protect their hands.

When the supply of shells ran low, the workers engaged in a work stoppage. On March 25, 1937. The Fremont Times Indireturned to work.

When the supply of shells from our local mussels ran low and shells had to be imported from other areas, the shipping costs were so high that it was decided to close down the operation.

The crushed shells can still be found around today.


